

Thank you to all of those loyal members who are paid up to current date, and beyond, as far as 2017! There are now approximately 80 renewed memberships that have taken advantage of the multi-year renewal option, allowing you to lock in your renewal rate for up to 5 years. Personally, I believe this is also an advantage in record keeping for all parties.

We currently have a total of 243 members on the mailing list, but some have not yet renewed with expiry dates in 2010, 2011 and 2012. We regret that we had to remove the 2010 tardy accounts, but we hope to get everyone back. If you are behind more than a year in your membership renewal, but you still get the newsletter, please send in your payment now so there is no interruption in your status. We will waive the tardy accounts and post the new payments to renewal period, but we need to have these received by April.

FIRE REPORT BY STUART GREAVES

With the dry weather in early spring 2012, the Ministry of Natural Resource was quick to declare the Sudbury region a restricted fire zone. That said, the Lake Panache community had a heightened awareness of the dry conditions and we all took additional precautions to ensure our fire pumps worked and the rules of the restrictions were enforced.


Your Campers Association, along with some anonymous donations, positioned seven fire pump kits around the lake in 2012. These kits contain a fire pump (runs on regular gas), 200' hose, a spray nozzle and suction line along with operating instructions. The locations of the kits are attached and are for all to use in the event of a fire. Please let any of the directors know if you have used the kits and return them the way you found them. Your Association has plans to add a few more fire kits around the lake in 2013.

Escaping for some summer fun requires the same amount of fire safety due diligence that you use at home. Before you can truly relax and enjoy the great outdoors, you need to know your family is Fire Smart. That means working smoke alarms on every camp level and outside sleeping areas, make sure the batteries are fresh and alarms are less than 10 years old. Make sure your camp is equipped with CO detectors if you have a fireplace, woodstove, gas water heater or any gas or propane appliances. Should a fire break out in your camp or surrounding area, please ensure your family has an escape plan and assembly area!

Another great investment to your camp tool kit is your very own fire pump, hose and nozzle or consider sharing a system with your camp neighbours!

Enjoy your treasured time on Lake Panache and please be Fire Conscious and Fire Smart!

KEEP YOUR SEPTIC SYSTEM WORKING WELL

Fortunately, regular septic maintenance and watching what you pour down your drains can prevent problems. Moderating your water use will help, too.

Watch what you put down the drain

Bacteria are critical in the septic system — they are what make it work. They thrive on wastewater but certain chemicals can kill them. Flushing even small amounts of prescription medications (e.g., antibiotics, chemotherapy drugs), paints, solvents, thinners, nail polish remover and other common household compounds can poison these helpful organisms. Laundry bleaches, toilet bowl cleaners and caustic drain openers can slow the treatment process, allowing sewage to pass through without proper treatment. And often, the chemicals themselves seep into the ground, sometimes contaminating wells or surface water.

Septic systems cannot digest oils, grease and fat. Besides plugging up your pipes, grease can combine with detergents and flow into the drainage field where it may clog the soils. Fats can form a blob in the top of the tank and interfere with the work of the bacteria. Oils, grease and fat can be composted, in moderation, under suitable conditions. These materials can usually go into the green bin or, if needed, out with the garbage. Adding these materials to your backyard composter may attract pests. You also shouldn't use your septic system to dispose of garbage. In-sink garbage disposals are unwelcome strains on the system. Disposable diapers, sanitary products and many other kinds of garbage can create problems for septic systems. If something doesn't break down naturally, don't flush it into your septic tank.

LIGHT REPORT BY PAUL YOUNG

As many of you know, the Association installs and maintains flashing amber lamps to mark the location of shoals in high traffic areas throughout the lake. This has been done for many years; quite frankly as long as I can remember. We currently have 46 lamps installed in the summer months. These are typically in place by the Victoria Day long weekend and removed sometime after Thanksgiving. This process is carried out by a number of volunteers who graciously donate their time and resources installing and maintaining these lights.

The lights have all been converted to solar powered LED lamps. They are relatively maintenance free, cutting down on volunteer hours, and allowing some lamps to remain installed throughout the winter season. The lights are a compact, sealed unit with a 1 mile range. As they are difficult to see during the day, we are installing reflectors on the light stands. This is not a quick process and it requires calm waters and fair weather.

You can all do your part to help by slowing down and not creating a wake if you see a volunteer working at a light location.

The Association wishes to remind everyone that the lights are markers only and do not serve any legal navigational purpose.

We hope everyone has a safe and happy summer boating on Lake Panache.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT BY STUART GREAVES

Greetings Lake Panache Campers!

It's that time of year again when the ice has covered our pristine water body and the snow has built up a nice base for the winter activities! Please be as careful on the ice as you are on the open water, safety first, safety always!

The 2013 camp season is well on its way and it's time to get you up to speed on the happenings around the lake. The 2012 camp season was one of the driest on record and the MNR had fire restrictions implemented early in the season (see the Fire Report for details). We enjoyed normal lake water levels until August when levels began to recede. The MNR reported the low levels were simply caused by a lack of rainfall and in turn a low ground water table. Let's hope for significant snow and spring rains to get the lake back to normal for the 2013 boating season.

Another very successful Annual Spring Thaw Dinner Dance in March drew a sell out crowd of 200 people for dinner, socializing and dancing. We were blessed with great support for the event and gave away some significant door prises. A **Big Thank You** to all our sponsors and all LPCA Directors who put it together, awesome job! After a long site evaluation process, the City of Greater Sudbury Environmental Services Department secured property on Northshore Road from the MNR for the new location of the waste disposal bins. Although the new location may not be everyone's first choice, we will be happy to finally see the bins moved from their current location at the water's edge. Construction started in the fall with site clearing and preparation, followed by the installation of privacy fencing and gates. Then in December, an act of vandalism occurred damaging the new fencing in the amount of \$10,000! We encourage anyone with information on this incident to contact Crime Stoppers! This act has delayed the completion and relocation of the bins at time of writing. Please remember that the waste bins are for <u>household curb side</u> <u>type waste only</u>— no compost material or hazardous waste and please take your heavy waste to the landfill just like you would for your home.

Your Association increased signage around the Marina area in 2012 to remind boaters of issues with Invasive Species and their effects on water quality. Please do your part to keep our pristine water body healthy and clean. At the request of many concerned boaters and camp owners, an additional Speed Limit - No Wake warning sign was installed in full view of everyone leaving the marina. Although reports are that it has helped, there are still some who insist on racing out or into the marina bay, please slow down! We will be erecting an additional sign for the 2013 season and you won't miss it!

Our Annual General Meeting was held on Tuesday November 20, 2012, at Tom Davies Community Centre Hall in Lively. Attendance was respectable and those who attended received some great information from our guest presenter, Constable Rick Bilcik from the Greater Sudbury Police Service Marine Unit. Constable Bilcik went over many marine rules and regulations and answered some very direct questions from the crowd. I think all who attended had a positive take away from his presentation.

At each Annual General Meeting, elections are held for positions on the Board of Directors for a three year term. Our two veteran directors, Brian Young and Rick Sleaver, stood for re-election in 2012 and we are very happy to have them back for another term with Brian as Treasurer and Rick as Secretary . Regretfully, we accepted the resignation of director Ava Vildis in mid-December; we thank Ava for her service with the Association. The directors elected Mr. Tim Walker to fill the remainder of Ava's term at our Directors' Meeting in January 2013. Tim is already involved with the Lake Stewardship Committee and is working together with our Lake Stewardship Chair Paul Fredette. We welcome Tim's fresh new ideas and enthusiasm. Please feel free to contact any of the directors with any questions or concerns you may have.

It was with deep regret that we learned of the passing of Jack Hamill earlier this year. Jack served as President of the Lake Panache Campers Association for many years and was deeply committed to our Association and Lake Panache. His many, many contributions will be felt for years to come. His family can be confident in the knowledge that Jack's contributions to Lake Panache will never be forgotten and our thoughts are with them.

Every year we look to bolster our membership in the Association and are encouraging all campers to join. All funds collected from memberships are used to cover the Association's expenses for liability insurance, maintenance of the Air Ambulance/Heli Pad Road, the public boat launch, dock and signage. In 2012, your Association, along with some anonymous donations positioned seven fire pump kits around the lake (see the Fire Report), your association maintains marker lights around the lake and organizes our annual Family Day Picnic. We look forward to having you as a member!

Toxic Taxi

Don't throw hazardous waste in the garbage, down the sink or in the sewer.

If you're unable to deliver your household hazardous waste to the Household Hazardous Waste Depot, please call the Toxic Taxi answering service at 705-560-9019 to make an appointment for free home collection service. Please leave your name and telephone number(s). Your call will be returned in 24 hours to schedule an appointment. Please note for safety reasons, the Toxic Taxi will not pick up waste if you are not home.

Examples of materials accepted:

Common examples of household hazardous waste include:

- butane lighters and cylinders - medicines household batteries - diesel
- car wax motor oil
 - antifreeze
- paints
- thinners - rust removers
- ammonia - fire extinguishers
 - pool chemicals
- fluorescent tubes
 - thermometers
- propane tanks and cylinders
- transmission fluid
- glues
- turpentine
- brake fluid
- gasoline
- cements
- paint strippers

Materials not accepted:

No commercial, industrial, institutional, pathological, PCB, explosive, radioactive or unknown waste will be accepted.

Please note:

- All waste must be clearly labelled and in sealed containers.
- Reuseable containers will not be returned (i.e. plastic gas cans).
- Do not mix different products together.
- Syringes must be in a puncture-proof container.
