FIRE REPORT BY STUART GREAVES

Thanks to Mother Nature and efforts of our fellow campers, 2014 was a quiet year for fires around the Lake Panache.

Only 2 fires were reported—one at the Navy Islands and one in the Newton's Bay Area. Both were quickly extinguished by campers and the Ministry of Natural Resources. Please visit our website and click on the AGM presentation for the fire locations.

Your Campers Association has 10 Fire Pump Kits located around the lake.

These kits contain a fire pump (runs on regular gas), 200' hose, a spray nozzle and suction line along with operating instructions. Please see the GPS coordinates on the next page or visit our website for the fire pump locations. The kits are for all to use in the event of a fire.

Please let any of the directors know if you have used the kits and return them the way you found them.

Escaping for some summer fun requires the same amount of fire safety due diligence that you use at home. Before you can truly relax and enjoy the great outdoors, you need to know your family is Fire Smart. Fire Smart means working smoke alarms on every camp level and outside sleeping areas, making sure the batteries are fresh and alarms are less than 10 years old.

Make sure your camp is equipped with CO detectors if you have a fireplace, woodstove, gas water heater or any gas or propane appliances. Should a fire break out in your camp or surrounding area, please ensure your family has an escape plan and assembly area! Also ensure you have your camp GPS coordinates available should you have to call in a fire emergency!

Another great investment for your camp tool kit is your very own fire pump, hose and nozzle or consider sharing a system with your camp neighbours!

LIGHT REPORT BY PAUL YOUNG

The Lake Panache Campers Association has maintained shoal markers for over 30 years.

These markers are lit with a flashing amber light for night time visibility. They were upgraded in recent years to solar powered LED lights for reduced maintenance and year round use. They are installed and maintained by volunteers and are typically available by the long weekend in May and removed sometime after Thanksgiving.

All marker poles, which pose a hazard to snowmobiles, continue to be removed and the remaining poles are now left out year round. We are in the process of adding reflective signs to the poles to increase their visibility during the day. This has been an ongoing effort and is often hampered by the weather. We hope to have this completed this summer.

We welcome feedback or suggestions. Also, if you see a marker light is out, please inform us either by email or call a director. We would like to thank our volunteers for their hard work, and we would like to remind you that our shoal markers are just that and not a legal navigational aid. Thank you and safe boating.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT BY STUART GREAVES

Greetings Lake Panache Campers!

The 2015 camp season is well on its way and it's time to get you up to speed on the happenings around the lake. We had an early start to winter in November, followed by some warmer weather and lots of rain. January was cold and the ice is getting thicker, some early season snowmobilers were making tracks on the ice and slush around January 10th! Please be as careful on the ice as you are on the open water, safety first, safety always!

Below are some key achievements by Your Association in 2014:

- The LPCA and Ministry of Natural Resources signed a 10-year memorandum of understanding for the use of the Air Ambulance Road, Public Dock and Emergency Helipad.
- The LPCA has been advised that Bell and Rogers are installing Cell Towers at Lake Panache.
- Solar lights were installed on the reflective cones at the Helipad and our Helipad is now certified for night operation and approved by ORNGE. LPCA is responsible for the maintenance and repair of the lights. We are looking for a caretaker for the grass cutting at the Helipad in the summer months. If you know of anyone interested, please contact any of the directors.

Our Plans for 2015:

- Repairs to the public dock and Ambulance Road maintenance.
- Collect history about Lake Panache and publish on the LPCA website.
- Continue Lake Stewardship initiatives to keep our lake pristine!

Our Annual General Meeting was held on Tuesday, November 25, 2014, at Tom Davies Community Centre in Lively. Guest speakers from the Canadian Power Squadron (Sudbury Office) and the Ministry of Northern Development and Mines were well received and generated many questions. Please see their contact information on our LPCA website for any inquiries. At each Annual General Meeting, elections are held for positions on the Board of Directors for a three-year term. Three of our directors, Paul Fredette, Nigelle Fredette and Tim Walker stood for re-election in 2014, and we are very happy they each accepted to serve for another term.

Paul, Nigelle and Tim head up our Lake Stewardship Committee and they have done a fantastic job setting up an extensive water sampling and monitoring program. Tim's expertise in computers and recording have produced some great Lake Stewardship videos that are available on our website. Please feel free to contact any of the directors with any questions, concerns or ideas you may have that would enhance our water quality initiatives. Your Lake Stewardship Committee held another Hazardous Waste Day at the Public Dock Saturday July 12, 2014, with another truck load of waste taken away from our lake to the city hazardous waste depot.

Crime Prevention Week brought the Greater Sudbury Police Service (GSPS) and LPCA together for an information stop on Panache Lake Road on Friday, November 7, 2014. The purpose was to advise all campers and home owners in the area about community policing, crime prevention and how important it is to have all your possessions identified in case of theft or loss. You can look forward to another information stop in this coming spring. A big Thank You to the GSPS for their continued support!

LAKE PANACHE STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE BY TIM WALKER

The Lake Panache Campers Association Stewardship Committee was formed in late 2011 to play an active role in keeping our lake in pristine condition. Our opportunity to enjoy and cherish our beautiful lake is accompanied by our responsibility to preserve its cleanliness, its health and its beauty for our children and coming generations of Lake Panache campers.

The Lake Panache Stewardship Committee has a mandate to renew and consolidate our efforts as campers, advocates and stewards of our lake by:

- Providing information and education.
- Monitoring water quality.
- Forming partnerships with all stakeholders.

The members of the Board of Directors and Stewardship Committee worked towards these goals last year in the following ways:

- Members of the Stewardship Committee regularly attend meetings of the Greater Sudbury Watershed Alliance (GSWA).
 GSWA is an independent grassroots, collaborative partnership of the lake, river and creek stewardship committees
 working together to promote and advocate for a healthy watershed. GSWA was very active this year in advocating for
 extensive watershed studies in Greater Sudbury as well as working with city partners on a Eurasian Water Milfoil
 Abatement Program. To learn more about the good work being done by the GSWA, visit the group at www.gswa.ca.
- The Stewardship Committee was once again joined this summer by co-op student Emilie Fredette who assisted with a
 number of events such as the second annual Household Hazardous Waste collection, ground maintenance of the Air
 Ambulance landing site and cleaning of the waste disposal site on North Shore Road. Thanks Emilie!
- On July 12, 2014, the second annual household hazardous waste (HHW) event was held at the Public Dock, Air Ambulance Road. Campers were encouraged to bring waste products to the site where the LPCA collected them and transported them to the city depot where they could be appropriately disposed of. HHW includes products, such as paint, batteries, motor oil antifreeze and other items, that can not be disposed of in the garbage. Once again, we managed to fill a truck and redirect these items from the landfill. Please mark July 11, 2015, on your calendar for the 3rd annual event. We hope to see you there.
- In the meantime, please ensure your hazardous waste is appropriately disposed of. Residents of the City of Greater Sudbury can call the Toxic Taxi (705-560-9019) to come to their property and pick up Hazardous Wastes or they can also drop off their waste at the depot on Frobisher Street on selected dates. Please check the City's website for more information about dates and what items qualify as hazardous waste (www.greatersudbury.ca/living/garbage-and-recycling/household-hazardous-waste/).
- The Stewardship Committee will continue its campaign towards informing campers of the value of planting a buffer zone
 of native plants near the waterfront of their properties. These native plants provide a buffer between our wastes and our
 lake, allowing the soil to absorb and filter pollutants before they get into the lake. One such example is Milkweed, which
 buffers pollution, anchors the soil against erosion and also provides a habitat for migrating butterflies. Please visit the
 Sudbury & District Health Unit website www.sdhu.com for more information on this subject.
- LPCA congratulates the Fairbank Lake Camp Owners for producing a very interesting document called Protect Our Lake.
 The manual outlines the responsibilities of all property owners and serves as a template for all lake stewardship groups and their members. LPCA was pleased to donate \$100 to the Fairbank Lake Camp Owners to offset the cost of producing this manual. We encourage members to read this manual as it can be found online at the following link: www.greatersudbury.ca/content/div_lakewaterquality/documents/Fairbank_Manual.pdf.
- The Stewardship Committee continues its mandate to conduct water testing in Lake Panache. During the summer of 2015, phosphorus levels will be measured at 12 sampling sites covering the entire watershed. In the summer of 2013, metal and phosphorus levels were found to be well within the guidelines set out by the province and consistent with the findings of the City of Greater Sudbury.

LAKE STEWARDSHIP CONTINUED

The stewardship committee will continue to monitor these water quality indicators over the coming years. Phosphorus will be measured annually and metals testing will occur every five years. If you're unable to deliver your household hazardous waste to the Household Hazardous Waste Depot, please call the Toxic Taxi answering service at 705-560-9019 to make an appointment for free home collection service.

Please leave your name and telephone number(s). Your call will be returned in 24 hours to schedule an appointment.

You may also make a Toxic Taxi appointment by email. Simply send an email to **Sudburytoxictaxi@hotzenvironmental.com** detailing your name, address and the waste you have to be collected. A representative will reply with an appointment date that you will be asked to confirm.

Please note for safety reasons, the Toxic Taxi will not pick up waste if you are not home.

Examples of materials accepted:

Common examples of household hazardous waste include:

- medicines - household batteries - butane lighters and cylinders

- car wax - diesel - kerosene

- motor oil - antifreeze - windshield washer

Materials not accepted:

No commercial, industrial, institutional, pathological, PCB, explosive, radioactive or unknown waste will be accepted. *Please note:*

- All waste must be clearly labelled and in sealed containers.
- Reusable containers will not be returned (i.e. plastic gas cans).
- Do not mix different products together.
- Syringes must be in a puncture-proof container.
